## The Gentiles Cry Out for Jesus

To grasp the inner motive of the Canaanite woman for obtaining what came to pass, we must reflect on the impact of her words. There is a firm belief that there was and still is in Israel a community of converts who passed over from the Gentiles into the works of the law. They had left behind their previous life and were bonded by the religion of a foreign land and dominating law as though from home. The Canaanites were inhabiting the lands of present-day Judea. Whether absorbed by war or dispersed to neighboring places or brought into servitude as a vanquished people, they carried about their name but lacked a native land. Intermingled with the Jews, therefore, these people came from the Gentiles. And since a portion of those among the crowds who believed were converts, the Canaanite woman most likely had left her territory, preferring the status of a proselyte - that is, coming out from the Gentiles to the community of a neighboring people. She was appealing on behalf of her daughter, who was a type for all the Gentile people. And since she knew the Lord from the law, she addressed him as Son of David. For in the law, the king of the eternal and heavenly kingdom is referred to as the "rod out of the stem of Jesse and the son of David." This woman, who professed Christ as both Lord and Son of David, did not need healing. Rather, she was begging for help for her daughter - that is, the Gentile people in the grips of unclean spirits.

# Stewardship

Inspiring a deeper understanding of true giving

February 2022

nce upon a time a band of knights riding through a forest saw hundreds of trees with targets painted on them and an arrow in the very center of every target. When the king heard of this he sent the knights back to find the archer who hit the bullseye every time. They found a wee, small boy and brought him back to the king.

The king asked how he ever managed such a remarkable feat. The boy answered, "It's easy, sir, first you shoot the arrow, then you paint the target."

Unfortunately, most churches today can't be quite as flexible as the small boy in the story when it comes to setting financial giving guidelines for its members.

Christians sometimes wonder how much they should give for God's work. Some people are inclined to be more generous than others, and there is often a question as to what is a person's rightful response. One of the best guides for Christian giving is proportionate giving. St. Paul refers to it in the last chapter of First Corinthians.

The Corinthians were taking part in a collection for the poor and needy saints in Jerusalem, and Paul gave them this advice: "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I come." From his recommendations we can see several guidelines for giving.

1. Make giving a priority. Determine to give "on the first day of the week."

Don't wait until the end of the week when the money is almost gone. If you

reach into your pocket or purse then, there probably won't be much left. When you get paid, take out God's portion first and set it aside. Those who give to God first, usually find that there is enough left for other needs.

2. Make giving a regular habit. The Apostle advises his hearers to practice giving "every week," Some people can be very generous in response to a specific appeal, but when their interest in the appeal fades, so does their sup-

port. In order for God's work through the church to be effective, giving needs to be a regular practice. No important work can be planned or be effective if

# **Living Waters Run Deep**


iving waters" brings to mind sparkling waterfalls, waves washing upon the beach, a spring bubbling from underneath a rock, a gentle rain falling, or of Jesus who said, "Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." (John 7:38)

Living so aptly describes water. A thirsty man attests to its living qualities, a drooping plant responds to its life giving properties, the skies are washed clear by its falling and a very weary soul finds rest in living water.

Created by God, it cannot be destroyed nor more be produced. It is fixed. Though we cannot destroy it, we can abuse it, pollute it, misuse it. and take from it its living properties, making it a curse rather than a blessing. It is ours to use, to protect, to keep clean, and to appropriate wisely so that it will give life to all it touches. We cannot take for granted that we will always have all the water we need, where we need it.

Let us each accept our personal responsibility to be good stewards of the water we have, lest our land cry out, "I was thirsty and you gave me no water to drink." Our need for conscious stewardship of our living waters was never greater than at present.





It is good for us to reflect upon the way we fulfill our role of steward, with regard to these three gifts from God: *Time*, *Talent* and *Treasure*.

Time. This is perhaps one of our most important resources. What do we do with the time that God gives us? Do we waste it? Do we use it to better the world in which we live? Do we spend it in such a way that most of our "time" is for our selfish ends? Do we have a healthy balance in our lives with regard to time? Time used to better our life and the life of those entrusted to us; time for personal relaxation and refreshment. How do you use your time?

Talent. We are perhaps one of the best resources we have in order to reach our destiny. Do I respect my own abilities and gifts? Do I develop them and use them for the kingdom of God? Do I use the gifts God has given me so that others may be happier? Do I see myself as unique, as important and gifted? In what way have I used my talents for myself, for my family, for my church and community? Jesus chastized the person who hid his talents under a bushel basket, or buried them in the ground. Have we done better with our talents than that servant?

**Treasure:** With the God-given gifts I am able to work, I am able to make



support is sporadic. Paul's advice is to give regularly.

- 3. Make giving a commitment. Decide to give a proportion of your available income for God's work. A percentage is best. Write it in as the first item in your budget planning. Consider this as your first obligation at each pay period. You should decide what proportion is best for you. If you agree to give God three percent of your income, and this week you earn \$100, you can give God \$3.00. If you agree to give God a tenth (the Biblical tithe), your gift would be \$10.00. Most important, make a commitment to God and follow through with it.
- 4. Make giving a matter of faith. Paul uses the phrase, "as you prosper." He realizes that your income may fluctuate. You may work overtime one week and be laid off for several days the next week. Your income may be seasonal or affected by other circumstances. But if you give proportionately, you can give something to God. The amount may vary, but the percentage will remain the same. Giving, after all, is a matter of faith. We believe that God's work is important, and we give so that it may

continue. But giving is also important for our sakes, for it is a natural and grateful response to God.

Unlike the small boy in the story at the beginning of the article, first paint your target, then shoot your "giving" arrow.
