Triumph of the True Faith


In one of the old churches oflstanbul, Turkey (formerly Constantinople), the local

people had the habit of coming in and bowing to the back wall of the spacious church. No one knew why people did this, since the sanctuary was at the other end of the church. When the old church was renovated it was discovered that concealed beneath the centuries-old layers of drab plaster and paint was a beautiful icon of the Mother of God. Further investigation into the matter confirmed that the people had a local custom of revering the sacred icon - even after it had been covered over with plaster by the non-Christian people who had custody of the church for many years.

Perhaps it is that the radiance of the Holy Images of Christ, His Blessed Mother and all the saints cannot lay concealed even under layers of plaster and centuries of persecution! On this day the Church celebrates the restoration oflcons (first instituted in 842 AD) and the end of the Iconoclastic Heresy which raged for many years in the early church.

Once blessed, an icon becomes a sacred object and a meeting place between God and man. Each icon is a "window into Heaven" and a reflection of the radiant light that emanates from God. Therefore, when we pray before an icon of Christ it is as though we are standing before the Lord Himselfl The same can be said of the holy images of all the saints. Let us remember, too, that we are also living icons of Christ and our light must shine upon others!

In the Gospel reading from Matthew wherein Jesus was preaching to 5,000 people and dusk was starting to set in, supper was long overdue, stomachs were starting to growl, and all there was to eat were two fish and five loaves of bread. The disciples were aware of the predicament. They said to Jesus, in effect, "This is a sticky situation, and we can't do anything about it anyway. experienced when he was able to write, "But everyone ate, and there was more than enough. They gathered twelve baskets full of leftovers!"


Do you think there could be any symbolic significance to the fact that there were twelve baskets full? One for each disciple? Enough to satisfy their needs for days to come? And all because they

For that matter, some of the most tired,





here are many cases listed in the Bible where giving is discussed. We need to be able to talk spiritually about giving. Jesus watched at the treasury to see how people gave. He wasn't checking amounts; he was studying people.

A woman broke an alabaster box of ointment and poured it on Christ. Christ commended the deed to others present. He said this gift would be forever a memorial to her (Matthew 26:6-13; Mark 14:3-9).

When Cain and Abel brought of-

ferings, their gifts were approved, disapproved, and recorded for us (Genesis 4:1-5).

When Israelites gave for the tabernacle, their gifts were noted (Exodus 35:4-29).

Exactly what the woman gave to Elijah is recounted for us (1 Kings 17:8-16).

Scripture mentions approvingly Asa's gifts to the house of the Lord (1 Kings 15:14-15).

Giving was public under David (1 Chronicles 22, 28, 29).

They set Joash's chest outside the gate of the house of the Lord. People dropped money into it there. Nothing secret about that (2 Chronicles 24:8-10)!

The early Christians "brought ... and laid ... at the apostles' feet" (Acts 4:34-35). Nothing private about that either. Ananias and Sapphira were struck dead for hypocrisy, not for giving in public (Acts 4:34 - 5:11).

Paul certainly wasn't secretive about his collection for the saints at Jerusalem (2 Corinthians 8, 9; 1 Corinthians 16:1, 21). Nor did he keep still about what the Philippians gave to him (Philipians 4).

We believe the matter boils down to motive in giving. Is it for show or for witness?

Our giving needs to reflect that God keeps on giving to us. "Give as you have been given." Our love for the Lord should make our giving joyful. God is never outdone in generosity.

Our stewardship is tested by our sharing the blessing God gives us.

family counselor's favorite bit of advice is, "Love is a four letter word spelled T-I-M-E." She maintains that the best way to prove your love for anyone is to spend time with them ... and for them.

The greatest of all commandments is this: "Love the Lord your God." That too involves our time.

God loved us first, the Bible records. It is good for us to remember that God proved his love by giving us his time ... time to share our sorrows, time to teach, time to pay the supreme sacrifice, time for everything we needed. As always, God gave in generous measure.

How sad then, for us to give so little time in return. We, of course, are the losers! Someone has quipped: "We are now stuck with a sixty minute God."

It would be another matter if we didn't much need God's company, or if this world of ours didn't require more loving acts of Christian service. Everywhere empty hearts and broken lives beg silently for some help. The sixty minute God can hardly begin to deal with all these problems, but the real God can do it.

Spend some time where it counts. Spend some time in God's presence to have your own empty heart filled, and spend some time in God's service filling the needs of people.


