Condemn Ourselves for Our Sins, and to Forgive Others


Two things therefore does He here require, both to condemn ourselves for our sins, and to forgive others; and the former for the sake of the latter, that this may become more easy (for he who considers his own sins is more indulgent to his fellow-servant); and not merely to forgive with the lips, but from the heart.

Let us not then thrust the sword into ourselves by being revengeful. For what grief has he who has grieved you inflicted upon you, like you will work unto yourself by keeping your anger in mind, and drawing upon yourself the sentence from God to condemn you? For if indeed you are watchful, and keepest yourself under control, the evil will come round upon his head, and it will be he that will suffer harm; but if you should continue indignant, and displeased, then yourself will undergo the harm not from him, but from yourself.

For if we be willing, no one shall be able to injure us, but even our enemies shall advantage us in the greatest degree. And why do I speak of men? For what can be more wicked than the devil; yet nevertheless, even hence have we a great opportunity of approving ourselves; and Job shows it. But if the devil has become a cause of crowns, why are you afraid of a man as an enemy?

See then how much you gain, bearing meekly the spiteful acts of your enemies. First and greatest, deliverance from sins; secondly, fortitude and patience; thirdly, mildness and benevolence; for he that knows not how to be angry with them that grieve him, much more will he be ready to serve them that love him. Fourthly, to be free from anger continually, to which nothing can be equal. For of him that is free from anger, it is quite clear that he is delivered also from the despondency hence arising, and will not spend his life on vain labors and sorrows.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The worldwide coronavirus outbreak restricted nonessential travel across the globe. Stay-at-home orders, physical distancing, and quarantine practices implemented to mitigate the spread of the disease revealed great and urgent needs, especially in those countries of Eastern Europe still in turbulent transition stages. There, weak economies were made more vulnerable, and those affected included the elderly as well as doctors, nurses, and medical chaplains. In Ukraine, the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) came to the assistance of homebound senior citizens in many cities, using Church facilities to organize the work and engaging both local volunteers and assistance from abroad. Using the Lviv Patriarchal Center kitchen, volunteers prepared meals and delivered them to needy seniors throughout the city. In addition, the UGCC mobilized its network of about 120 hospital chaplains and collected and distributed badly needed protective clothing, masks, sanitizer, and other necessities to ensure their safety as they ministered to the sick throughout the country.

"When you know that someone cares about you and that you are not alone in your struggles," said Fr. Volodomyr Malchyn of the UGCC, "it is much easier to go through all kinds of challenges." Your participation in the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe expresses your care and support for the people in Ukraine and throughout the region, especially in times of crisis and disruption.

In Albania, a country that experienced a particularly harsh form of communism, many young women facing extreme poverty succumb to misleading promises of marriage or work opportunities, drop out of school, and travel abroad. Separated from their families, they often find themselves in the difficult circumstances of domestic violence or even forced prostitution. The Catholic Church of Albania, which is being restored after the fall of communism, is at the forefront of helping young women overcome these risks through tuition support, the arts, faith activities, and culinary workshops that prepare them for work that allows them to support themselves and to contribute to their family budgets. With support from the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe, the Laura Vicuña Center and the Rogationist Fathers' high school has provided education, skills training, and brighter futures to 13 young women from the town of Tale. When you participate in the collection, you help to make education and life opportunities a reality for at-risk youth, such as the young women in Tale, and you provide a witness of the faith to a recovering region.



Inspiring a deeper understanding of true giving

August 2021

Ithough Christ obviously shows preference for the poor of spirit and the little ones of this world, he was not giving anyone the right to sanction hatred, envy or dislike of the rich. It is true that the majority have to work by the sweat of their brow, even as the rich seem to get richer, with far more ease. This at times can cause resentment and anger when we see the disproportion all around us.

Steerage and first class

In the movie *Titanic*, those in steerage and those in first class give us a microcosm of the world divided into classes as we traverse the seas of life. We have to keep in mind that it also is true that many rich people are generous and have contributed great amounts for the common good. Therefore, there should be no generalization of the rich as though they were all no better than Dives was, in Luke 16:19-31.

Rather than envy the rich, Christ gives us the warning: First things first. Share what little or largess you have. Do not hoard your possessions ... whatever they are. When we die, all we have is ourselves, bigger and wealthier spiritually for having shared our gifts, or poorer for having settled for the here and now with nothing but the insatiable fires of greed to live with throughout eternity. *There is no bridging the gulf between steerage and first class once we break the thread here.*

There is always a payback

There is another thing to be considered here, largely overlooked. One might call it a secret: "you can not really give anything away," or the more familiar perhaps, "cast your bread on the waters, and it always returns." While an immediate return is certainly not our main reason for sharing our material largess, the Lord shares for those who will see.

As a kind of built-in necessary out-






come of our sharing, we will find that we will receive here and now, in one way or another, a return. We are not speaking of that snugly warm and cozy "what a great boy am I" of a Tom Thumb, or that insistent voice within us that keeps shouting "nice going," for those things we are only

The story is told of two men who were caught stealing sheep. Their punishment was to be branded on the forehead, "ST" (sheep thief). One of the branded men unable to deal with his brand immediately moved to another area to live.

could have walked right by him ... I was leaving church and had several things to do. But there he was just sitting with his head down. I've noticed recently he has the look of someone with a heavy heart.

"Feel like talking?" I asked as I sat in the pew in front of him. He talked about his marriage while I sat there listening. When he finished, I didn't lecture him in Biblical truth, nor did I tell him what he should do. I showed he mattered by just giving him some time. All the 'important' things I was rushing out to do suddenly seemed less urgent. I remembered a Men's Retreat coming up in a few weeks and invited him to come along. I gently told him he's not alone.

Too often, we get so caught up in the busyness of life that we miss the opportunities God has right in front of us. Ask God to use you in the life of someone else today. Just a little of our time can make a huge difference in the life of a hurting soul. Quite often, they're seated in the pew right next to us.

The work of the complete without your help as a member of the "team." Everyone must work together to form a beautiful picture of what God can do through the ministry of your church. Each steward can find and fill his or her place.

Mirrors and Windows

irrors and windows are both found in most homes and both made of glass, but differ in one very important way. Mirrors tell us about ourselves, while windows tell us about others.

Indeed it may be in things so unassuming as a surprise thank you from someone, or a smile, or an unexpected release from one of our problems.

More important by far, it will be an awareness that we are truly doing for others what Christ has done and continues to do for us. There is always a payback, although we might not seek it. And all that is required is an openness to God's presence and a humble thank you to the Lord for giving us the opportunity and means to share and so identify with him. Seeking only God, we receive all. Isn't this reward in itself without waiting for later? It most certainly is!



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
